Local health and care issues

- 5. In January the Healthwatch Board escalated its concerns about stories of people's access to mental health support and services. Distilling these in a letter Sandie Smith and I have since visited Tracy Dowling, CEO of Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Foundation Trust and are awaiting her response.
- 6. OFSTED reported on children's social care services in Cambridgeshire in February. The quality and timeliness of services remains less than good. Leaders are taking well considered actions. The most significant challenge is the size of caseloads.

- 7. Cambridge University Hospitals Trust, also in February, retained the overall Care Quality Commission Good rating but with an improved picture of the quality of care and leadership.
- 8. At its January meeting in public the Sustainability and Transformation (STP) Board reported on the public/ patient focus in the south of the county to develop community hubs integral with primary care services. The North and South Alliance Delivery Groups are overseeing STP work around each of the acute Trusts; Cambridge University Hospitals for the south and North West Anglia Trust for the north. Each of the groups has a programme of work which is focused around integrated neighbourhoods in the respective areas.
- 9. The success of Living Well Partnerships between local authorities and health-related partners was discussed at the Cambridgeshire Health & Wellbeing Board. Whilst the partnership was seen as broadly beneficial the ability of NHS staff to engage is limited and further thought is being given to how these conversations and relationships can be developed.

10. Healthwatch has facilitated a first health and care forum for Fenland, building on the success of similar meetings in Peterborough and Huntingdonshire. The aim is to support conversations between local people and their health and care providers about changing services, and to help make the most of that intelligence and action across the system where appropriate. We plan to encourage action learning and evaluation in the autumn, looking to strengthen local engagement and participation from our experiences so far.
