A problem has been found when organisations who have a bus need a Blue Badge. The IT system has a fault, and the process has been changed. 5		Update from the Learning Disability Partnership and
	My area	SEND Martine from the Preparing for Adulthood Team has joined the Partnership Board. She is finding it interesting to hear what people are saying.
		Preparing for Adulthood is about working with young people aged 14-20, about what they want when it comes to health, employment and housing.
		They want to improve the outcomes for people.
		Gareth told us that the Integrated Care System (the NHS) are funding a nurse to work with them on the quality of health checks.
		Gareth said that counselling (a talking therapy) was now available in group settings through the IAPT service.
		The Councils are looking at respite provision – for both emergency situations and for regular stays.

	The Councils are also looking at Day Opportunities and Employment Pathways.
6	Advocacy
	Karen Berkley, Commissioner, told us about the Advocacy Service that is delivered by Voiceability for the Councils.
	The Councils are looking at the service and how it could be delivered differently in the future.
	Marion Atherton from Voiceability, explained what the Advocacy Service is.
	Advocacy is where an independent person helps support someone to understand their options when it comes to decisions that they need to make. The advocate helps the person to know their rights and ensure the person's views are heard.
	There are two types of advocacy, Statutory and General Advocacy.
	Statutory Advocacy is where the law says you have a right to be supported. Examples of this could be about care assessments, where people who are in hospital due to mental ill health.
	General Advocacy is where the law doesn't say you have a right to support, but that the person would like it.
